"The Woody Plants of Summer - Native and Abroad" is the title of a two-session class offered July 23 and 30 by the Rutgers NJ Agricultural Extension Service's Office of Continuing Professional Education.

The classes will be taught by Steve Kristoph an adjunct instructor at Rutgers for more than 25 years and owner of Steven Kristoph Nursery in Millstone Township, Monmouth County, where he

grows many types of ornamental trees, shrubs, and herbaceous perennials.

Both classes, described below, will begin with a short presentation followed by an outdoor experience where you'll learn how to identify each plant, learn where it grows, when to plant it, and to appreciate its ornamental value. The class will cover many of the species and cultivars that are leading the current trend in woody plant material. You'll receive plants to take home.

You may enroll for either or both classes. The cost is \$210 for one class or \$375 for both classes. Continental breakfast and deli buffet lunch are included. Preregistration is required. During registration, you can choose whether to enroll for one class or both. Earn 5.5 Rutgers Master Gardener CEUs for each class.

Classes will be held at Holly House, 130 Log Cabin Road, New Brunswick. You're advised to follow the Rutgers directions (not GPS) by clicking here.

The plants are labeled for demonstration and aren't used for any other purpose although wild residents of the zoo munch on them occasionally. The garden also contains some ornamental sections.
